
Why I came back this year?

THE WEF

The World Economic Forum was established 1971 as a non-profitfoundation, headquartered in Geneva, Switzerland. From generating stakeholder interaction, it moved to enabling joint stakeholder action leading to collective impact.

"We believe that progress happens by bringing together people from all walks of life who have the drive and the influence to make positive change." (From the mission statement www.weforum.org

Key topics summary

Apart from providing a place to discuss geopolitics, the main topic during this years WEF was clearly AI. Sustainability was less prominent, likely as society is moving from debate to action. Womens Health and Equality was the 3rd most mentioned topic in media during these days, followed by the concerns around how to build the workforce of the future.

- Geopolitical Dynamics: This topic was not addressed on the Promenade, instead mainly in the reserved area and online. The WEF published and discussed its Global Risk 2024 report in which 30% of survey participants expect stormy and turbulent times ahead within 2 years, but more than 60% in 10 years. Insights from McKinsey highlighted the essence of speed and agility for superior resilience and performance. The word "coopetition" was created, meaning a balance between cooperation and competition, to foster common goals amidst divergent interests .
- The Al Frontier: Davos was abuzz with Al, featuring the "House of Al" on the Promenade, hosting 180 speakers across 44 sessions, drawing over 5000 attendees.

The generative AI revolution, still in its infancy, promises transformative impacts across various sectors, heralding a new era of efficiency and innovation.

Each day focused on a different aspect of the AI journey: The state of AI, risks and opportunities, applications, the next frontier and outlook. all videos are available <u>here</u>.

The AI & Trust session on Tuesday offers some great insights into the prerequisites of trust: 1. Visible benefit, positive impact, 2. Understanding the technical models, being able to explain what AI does and 3. People centricity. How can we re-upskill our workforce and make customers want to engage through chat bots and alike.

The good news: Many use cases proof the immense opportunity for positive change, especially in the Health sector.

- Women's Health: There was a lot of talk about how taking advantage of AI can really change women's healthcare for the better. In the past. women's health often didn't get enough attention in the research and development stage, prioritising men related applications. This led to a much smaller, often biased data pool, A special panel discussed how bridging the data gap could lead to better ways to find and treat health issues, Co-designing applications, increasing the share of women in STEM, will eventually support a more gender neutral healthcare development. - Climate and Nature: The SDG Tent provided a space to pick up from last years conversations. Discussions underscored the intertwined nature of climate action, energy transition, and biodiversity, emphasizing the importance of addressing these issues collectively to foster a sustainable and inclusive future. EY highlighted the importance of interconnectivity, pairing it with the suggestions of taking existing inequalities between nations and social groups within into account to build realistic, inclusive action plans.
- The Future Workforce: "Set and guide a vision for how to reinvent work, reshape the workforce and prepare workers for a generative AI world", "And it will mean leaders with different skills, who make change a core part of company culture by giving people a voice in the process." Democratizing AI, placing humancentric values at the core, were reiterated in several of the discussions. Employees need to be curious about exploring new technologies, whilst companies and public organisations need to focus on how to embed them into daily life.

Digital transformation covers People and Processes to be successful. People will need to feel taken onto that journey, experience benefits to support trusted expansion.

To end with a comment from Amit Joshi, Prof at IMD, during his presentation at the UAE Pavillon: "Students will be able to use AI in their works, but will have to show their value add beyond using the prompts to validate their knowledge.
